Recyclable	Non-Recyclable	<p>These items are defined as “landfill” because they cannot be remade into another material</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Chip bags</li> <li>• Food wrappers</li> <li>• Fruit peels</li> <li>• Gum</li> <li>• Napkins, tissues</li> <li>• Styrofoam from inside and outside venders</li> <li>• Takeout food wrappers</li> <li>• Plastic wrap</li> </ul>	
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Glass bottles</li> <li>• Glass containers</li> <li>• Tin cans</li> <li>• Pop cans</li> <li>• Steel cans</li> <li>• Aluminum foil</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Lightbulbs</li> <li>• Broken glass</li> <li>• Metal utensils</li> <li>• Loose metals like hardware or paper clips</li> <li>• Batteries</li> <li>• Electronics</li> <li>• Aerosol cans</li> </ul>
